# Transforming Care





## OUR NEW MISSION

Equitas Health's new mission is to be the gateway to good health for those at risk of or affected by HIV/AIDS, for the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer/questioning (LGBTQ) community, and for those seeking a welcoming healthcare home.

Our 2015 - 2016 fiscal year brought significant change and continued growth for our organization. A culmination of over a year's worth of work we undertook a massive transition that began in earnest in August 2015 when several key staff completed a "technical visit" with Fenway Health, the leading LGBTQ healthcare organization in the country. At that time, we were considering a new strategic direction for our organization as a way to transform care in our community.

## A MESSAGE TO OUR SUPPORTERS, FUNDERS, PARTNERS & ADVOCATES

As a result of that process, in April 2016 we announced a mission expansion and rebrand. Going forward, it is our vision that individuals living with or affected by HIV/AIDS, the LGBTQ community, and others who experience medical disparities in our communities will have access to the highest quality healthcare and preventative services. Our new mission is **to be the gateway to good health for those at risk or affected by HIV/AIDS, for the LGBTQ community, and for those seeking a welcoming healthcare home.**

Our new name is **Equitas Health**. *Equitas* comes from Latin origins, meaning justice, fairness, and equity, and our new tagline is *Care for All*. These values have always been core to our mission; our new name now puts them front-and-center.

This evolution is a natural transition for our organization. We are proud of the more than three decades of leading Ohio's fight against HIV/AIDS. Today, with 13 offices in 10 cities, we are assisting nearly 5,000 HIV-positive Ohioans, including more than 1,900 who receive treatment at our Dayton and Columbus medical centers, and more than 500 Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP) patients. Thousands more are reached with our prevention, testing and other services. We are excited to embrace our expanded mission as a strategic step to further that legacy and its reach, by providing care for all—with a focus on a safe and open space and highest-quality healthcare for the LGBTQ community and others who are medically underserved.

This annual report covers our fiscal year, July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016. As you will read in the enclosed pages Equitas Health's continued growth and achievements during this period are remarkable. Our work would not have been possible without the continued support of people like you, our staff, donors, volunteers and allies. Thank you all! We are excited for what the future has in store for us and those for whom we will provide the care and services they need to live healthy and happy lives.

The move to expand our mission and services was based on research focused on healthcare disparities that exist in the LGBTQ community. According to a 2015 Kaiser Family Foundation study and other research, many LGBT individuals report

negative experiences when seeking care, ranging from disrespectful treatment, providers' lack of awareness of LGBT health needs, to outright denial of care, shaming, or blaming the patient's sexual orientation or gender identity as the cause for an illness.

## ADDRESSING LGBTQ HEALTHCARE DISPARITIES

LGBT individuals experience more chronic conditions and a higher prevalence and earlier onset of disabilities than heterosexuals, such as mental health disorders, substance abuse, homelessness, HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and suicide. Transgender persons are more likely to live in poverty, less likely to have health insurance, experience the greatest challenges, including stigma, and are often least likely among LGBT individuals to report their health as excellent or very good. And, members of the LGBT community are still most impacted by HIV.

To address these disparities, we rebranded and expanded our mission and scope of services to achieve better health outcomes for medically-underserved individuals, including those within the LGBTQ community. An estimated 394,856 Ohioans are LGBTQ, with 39,000 of those estimated to be transgender. The need for culturally competent care in a safe welcoming environment is critical to eliminating these healthcare disparities. In addition, our expanded primary care offerings will enhance our ability to reach populations living with, or most at risk for HIV.

INSTITUTE FOR LGBTQ HEALTH EQUITY

To better serve our communities and transform care across Ohio we have launched the Equitas Health Institute for LGBTQ Health Equity.

The Institute serves as the education, research and community engagement arm of Equitas Health, focusing on reducing health disparities in the LGBTQ community. The Institute is developing and delivering exceptional LGBTQ culturally competent healthcare education and training, engaging with LGBTQ and HIV-positive patients, working with community based organizations and supporting LGBTQ health research efforts in our region.



**Transforming Care**  
Midwest Conference on LGBTQ Health Equity and HIV/AIDS

The Institute in collaboration with the Ohio AIDS Coalition organized the inaugural Transforming Care: Midwest Conference on LGBTQ

Health Equity and HIV/AIDS in late October. Over 450 health and social service providers, community members, advocates, researchers, students, activists and community leaders gathered to address the vast health disparities that affect the LGBTQ community and those living with HIV/AIDS.

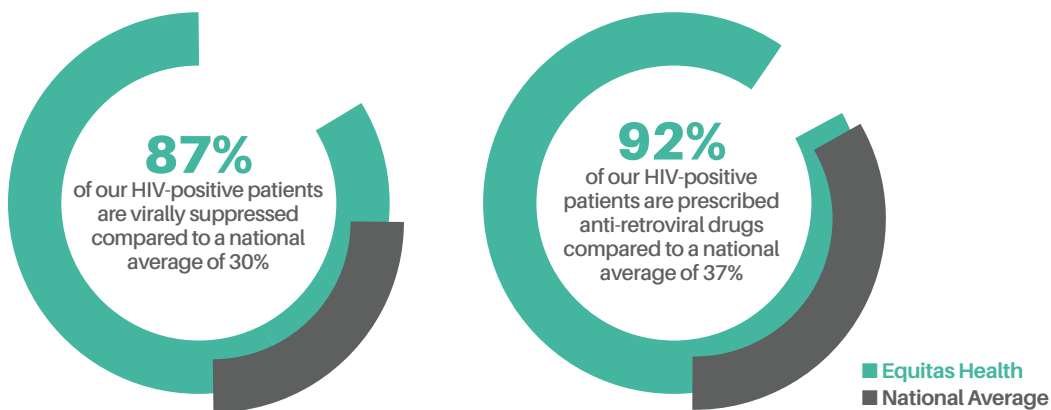
## HIV/AIDS AT THE FOREFRONT OF OUR MISSION

Equitas Health has been a leader in the battle against HIV/AIDS since the beginning of the epidemic and we remain committed to continue that work until there's a cure. Today, as

we transform HIV care in Ohio, we remain one of the largest providers of HIV/AIDS services in the state and among the largest in the nation.

This year, nearly 1,400 HIV-positive patients received treatment at Equitas Health Medical Center and Pharmacy locations and another 4,310 clients were provided supportive services such as linkage to medical care, housing assistance, emergency financial assistance and health navigation. Increasingly HIV care is being delivered as a subset of primary care allowing for our medical teams to address all aspects of a patient's healthcare needs.

Our patients are achieving successful health outcomes through our integrated care model.



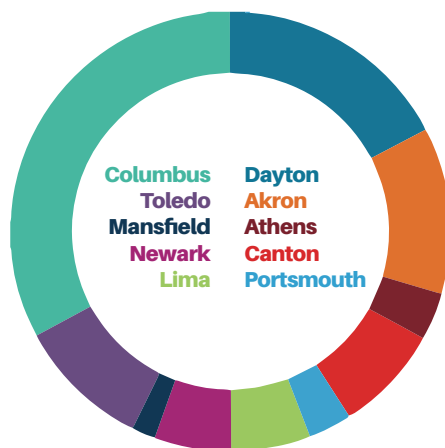
Achieving viral suppression allows our HIV-positive patients to be able to live healthier lives as well as ensure that the risk of transmission is negligible to uninfected partners.

This past year our prevention department, with staff across multiple offices in Ohio, reached 43,700 individuals through HIV testing, education and outreach. We provided 4,447 HIV tests and counseling sessions. Those testing positive were provided the opportunity to be linked to care and services through our medical centers, offices and other community resources.

Equitas Health’s HIV/AIDS Health Navigation program is another area where we are able to help meet critical needs for those living with HIV. Our offices located in rural and urban cities across Ohio are able to effectively link clients to medical care as well as provide additional supportive services such as housing and emergency financial assistance. Approximately 50 medical social workers assist our clients every day in enrolling clients in the Ohio HIV Drug Assistance Program (OHDAP) which provides medications to treat HIV and HIV-related conditions. This program is one of the important components of the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program supporting those in need of financial assistance for treatment, medications, and vital HIV services not covered by insurance. Increasingly our staff help individuals enroll in health insurance plans available through the Affordable Care Act as well as Medicaid and Medicare to ensure they have the coverage they need.

## PLAN TO END HIV TRANSMISSIONS IN OHIO

Over the past year, the Ohio AIDS Coalition, a division of Equitas Health, drafted a plan to decrease the rate of new HIV infections. It incorporates perspectives from Ohio’s HIV/AIDS community, consumer advocates, and experts in the fields of HIV/AIDS, legal, education, policy and healthcare systems.

### The plan presents 3 priorities to achieve an end to HIV transmissions:

1. Increase public awareness about the current state of HIV/AIDS treatment and prevention.
2. Utilize newly available large scale health systems to reduce community viral load numbers.
3. Remove barriers to HIV-positive persons obtaining and maintaining viral suppression.

In compliance with federal directives to state departments of health, the state administration has formed a steering committee comprised of Ohio agency representatives, managed care plan representatives, hospital representatives, consumer advocates, and policy subject matter experts to gather information necessary to produce a coordinated state plan. That plan, set to be released in the fall of 2016, will contain a variety of goals drawn from the central themes of the Ohio AIDS Coalition Plan.

## PATIENT-CENTERED MEDICAL CARE

In 2012, we opened our first Medical Center and Pharmacy in Columbus utilizing a patient-centered medical home model that integrates multiple

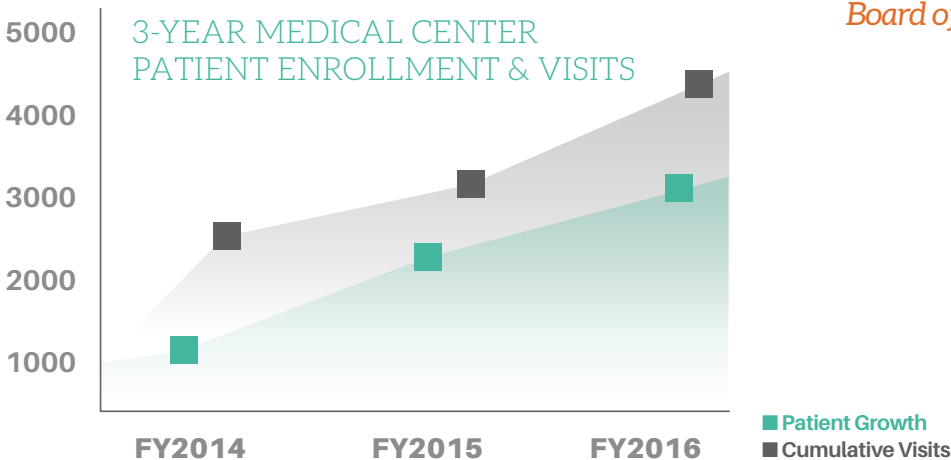
components of patient care. This model establishes relationships between patients and their primary care providers, and when appropriate, the patient’s family to ensure they are receiving high quality, culturally and linguistically appropriate care. The model also utilizes an interdisciplinary team approach where clinicians, medical social workers, behavioral health therapists and our pharmacists work together to coordinate patient care. The model has been very successful in keeping patients engaged in care and meeting their medical needs. Research has demonstrated that medical homes can lead to higher quality and lower costs and can improve patients’ and providers’ experiences of care.

The Columbus and Dayton Medical Centers and Pharmacies have been positioned to lead the organization in our mission expansion. Our expanded services now include primary medical care, specialized HIV care, PrEP/PEP, behavioral health, HIV/STI screening, Pharmacy, women’s health, transgender health and comprehensive harm reduction services.

Services at our Medical Centers and Pharmacies are open to anyone seeking a welcoming healthcare home.

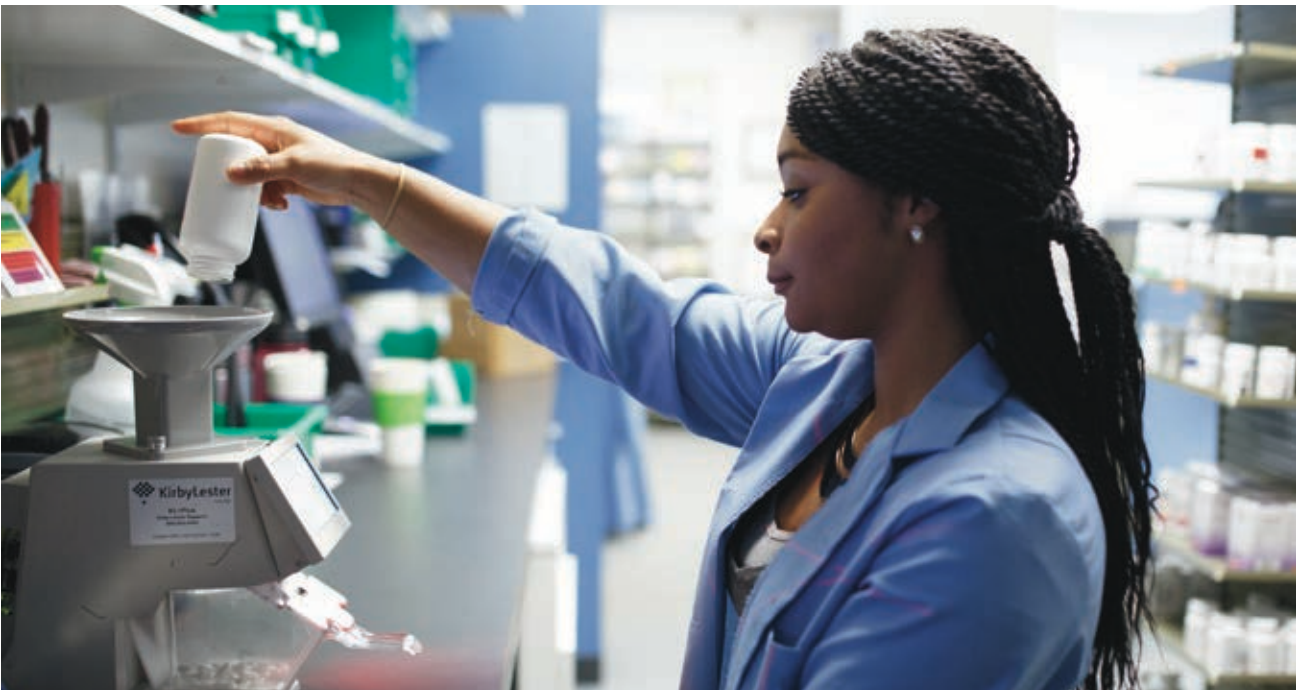
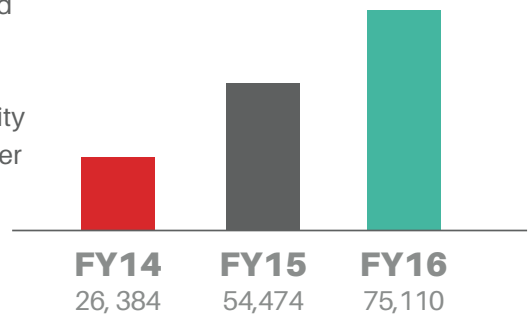
Our Pharmacy continues to transform our organization's ability to deliver care. Since opening its doors in 2012, it has served as one of the pillars of our integrated care model.

Our pharmacists are able to assist patients in remaining adherent to their drug regimens through individualized counseling and refill follow-ups. As a social enterprise, 100 percent of Pharmacy profits are reinvested back into the organization's programs and services, providing an earned income revenue line for our organization while providing a critical service for our community.

Our Pharmacy is exceeding expectations in patients served and prescriptions filled and has received accolades from social entrepreneurs and business leaders for its ability to provide financial sustainability and for contributing to our ability to better serve our patients.

## COMPREHENSIVE HARM REDUCTION

Our behavioral health program continues to grow and expand to help meet the critical needs in our community. In early 2016, we launched Safe Point, a

comprehensive harm reduction program to help address central Ohio's ongoing opiate epidemic. The program is designed to reduce the negative consequences of drug use, reduce the overall level of drug consumption, help prevent new HIV and other blood-borne infections and link participants to recovery programs. This program is critical to providing care to individuals who have experienced stigma and a lack of resources to help address their needs. We are working to transform the care needed to successfully keep participants healthy and alive.

Since its February 2016 launch, our Safe Point program has served 456 program participants of which 100 percent have been educated on the use of Naloxone, an opiate overdose antidote.

Our staff Cultural Competency Committee is continuing its work in helping our organization meet the National Standards for Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services (CLAS) in Health and Health Care. These standards are intended to advance health equity, improve quality, and help eliminate healthcare disparities by establishing a blueprint for healthcare organizations. During the last year we were able to successfully implement a language assistance program which offers interpretation services in 200 different languages and dialects in all 13 of our offices.

The language assistance services offers interpreters to individuals who have limited English proficiency and/or other communication needs, at no cost to them, to facilitate timely access to all healthcare and services.

The list at left identifies languages interpreted at our offices throughout Ohio and demonstrates the diversity of the patients and clients we are serving. We believe in the importance providing language access as a critical component to healthcare and social service delivery.

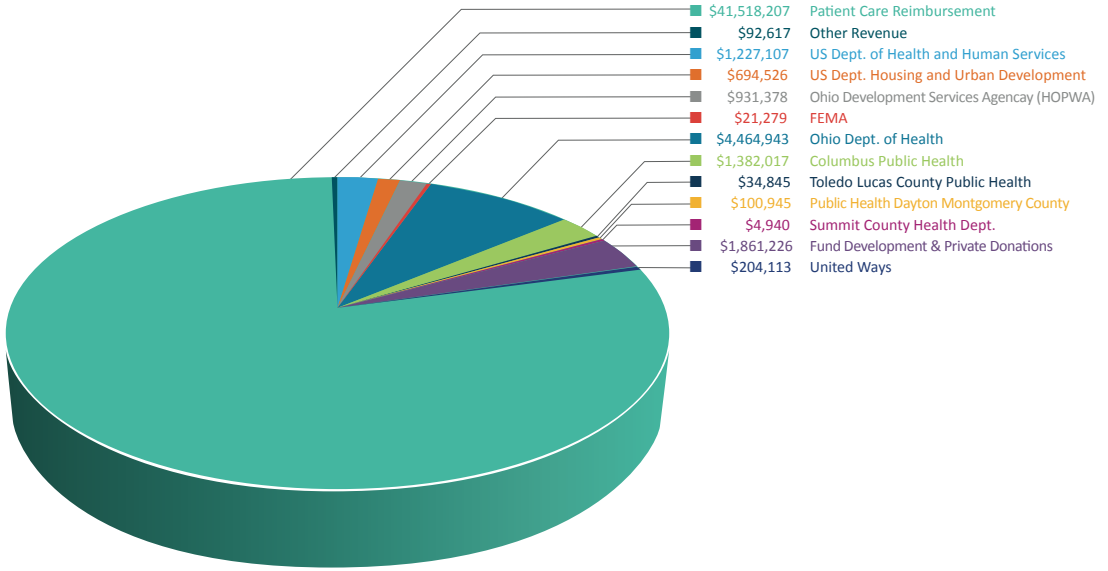

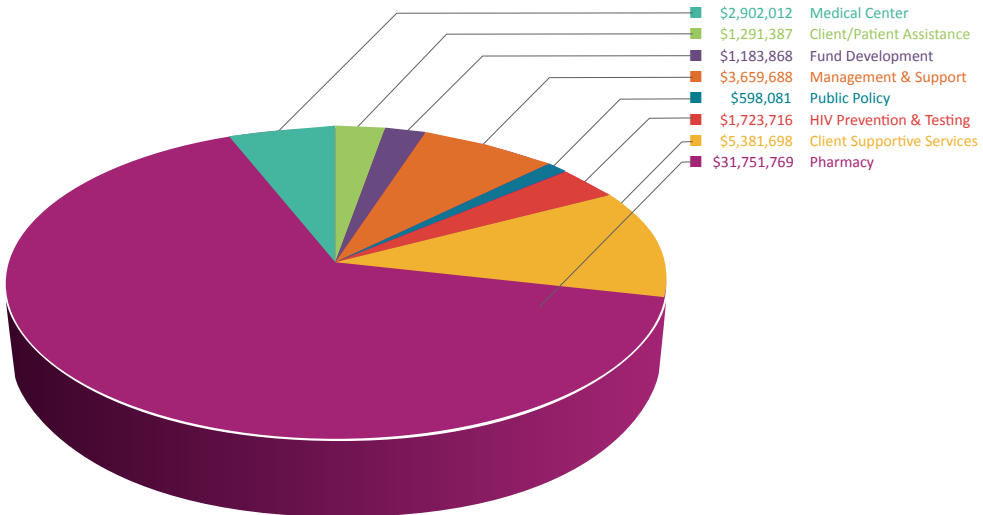

Revenue: \$52,538,142



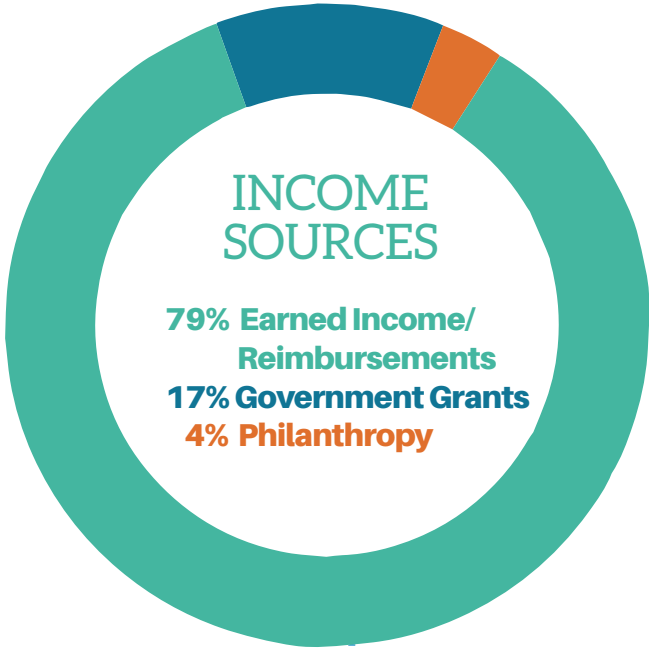
Expenditures: \$48,492,218

## DONOR SPOTLIGHT: Tom W. Davis



When Tom Davis made his first gift to the Columbus AIDS Task Force in the early 1980s, the city was in the midst of the AIDS epidemic. “Back then, we lost so many people that my whole idea of giving was that if I could save one life, it was worth every penny I had,” recalls Tom. That initial donation began decades of extraordinary generosity to Columbus AIDS Task Force, AIDS Resource Center Ohio, and now Equitas Health. Tom’s gifts have had a remarkable impact on the organization throughout our history and on the thousands of people we serve.

In 2012, Tom’s gift of \$100,000 to the Columbus Campaign for Hope, the largest received, was instrumental in the creation of Equitas Health’s Columbus Medical Center & Pharmacy. He cites the excellent care and programs offered at the center as one of the most impactful services Equitas Health provides to the community. Additionally, Tom has been a longtime sponsor and supporter of Art for Life – Equitas Health’s biennial art auction fundraiser – since it was first held in 1989.

Today, Tom’s support of Equitas Health is driven by his passion for helping the next generation of individuals affected by HIV/AIDS. “There are too many young people out there who do not realize they are at risk,” says Tom. He hopes that his contributions will continue to support Equitas Health’s work educating younger individuals and preventing new HIV infections.

Above all else, Tom understands the importance of philanthropy. “My real philosophy is ‘the more you give, the more you get back.’ Whether it be health, wealth, anything—I think it’s very important, because no one knows how many days they’ve got left. So they need to step up and do what they can.” Thanks to Tom and his generosity, Equitas Health can continue to provide critical services and care to those impacted by HIV/AIDS, the LGBTQ community, and other medically underserved populations.
